Artistic Director - Steven Bell

Steven L. Bell has been the Artistic Director of the Teaneck Community Chorus since 2000. He recently retired as the Director of Vocal Music at Teaneck High School where he conducted the Mixed Chorus, Concert Choir, and award-winning Madrigal



Singers. He also served as the Instructional Leader of the Teaneck High School Department of Fine and Performing Arts.

He taught AP Music Theory and was the Director and Musical Director of the school's annual musical. He had also taught Choral Methods at Montclair State University. Previously he taught music at Leonia Middle School, the Dwight School in Manhattan, and elementary and junior high schools in Teaneck. In his role as Musical Director, Mr. Bell has been nominated four times as Outstanding High School Musical Director by the Papermill Playhouse's Rising Star Awards and has won this distinction in 2004 for his production of Company at Fair Lawn High School.

<u>Chorus Pianist - Daniel Stocker</u>



Daniel Stocker joined the Teaneck Community Chorus as its pianist in its 2019-2020 season. He is currently on staff at Porch Light Studio, Stage and Schools (Glen Rock, NJ) as music director where he teaches private voice lessons and music directs a number of musical theater productions. His favorite credits at Porch Light include, Into the Woods, Matilda, and The 57th National Mathlete Sum-It. Daniel is also a member of the music ministry at St. Mary's R.C. Church in Pompton Lakes, NJ.

The virtual TCC season saw Daniel take on additional responsibilities within the chorus, including audio editing and mixing a number of songs in Bagpipes, Banjos and Songs (Winter 2021) and The Arc of Justice (Spring 2021).

He earned a Bachelor of Music in Piano Performance at Boston University under the instruction of Dr. Linda Jiorle-Nagy and graduated cum laude in May 2019.

Cellist-Mark Serkin



Mark Serkin is a Doctor of Musical Arts candidate at Rutgers University where he studies with cellist Jonathan Spitz, Principal Cello of the New Jersey Symphony Orchestra. Mark has performed at Alice Tully Hall, Carnegie Hall, and various other venues. He received his Bachelor's and Masters' degrees with honors in cello performance at Mannes School of Music, studying with Barbara

Stein Mallow and Jeffrey Zeigler. Mark has participated in many festivals such as Meadowmount School of Music, Kinhaven Music School, NY Philharmonic Biennial, Manchester Music Festival, Taconic Music, Luzerne Music Center, and the National Orchestra Institute and Festival, where he recorded for the Naxos label in 2015 and 2016. Mark has performed in solo and chamber master classes for artists such as

Steven Isserlis, Sharon Robinson, Timothy Eddy, Robert DeMaine, Jonathan Spitz, Peter Stumpf, Julia Lichten, Gloria dePasquale, Kronos Quartet, Horszowski Trio, Catalyst Quartet, and the Miró Quartet. His main mentors include Hans Jørgen Jensen, Vladimir Panteleyev, Todd Phillips and Nancy Wilson.

Pittman / Daniels Quartet



The Pittman / Daniels Quartet - is a jazz ensemble based out of Teaneck, NJ. It consists of Reggie Pittman on Trumpet, Loren Daniels on keyboards, Belden Bullock on acoustic base, and Jonathan Peretz on drums. The band has collaborated on two CDs. "Point A to Point A" was the first with the second CD titled "Smilessence".

Reggie Pittman - (trumpet) is a professional musician with over 30 years experience in the music business. He works in the music fields of performance, recording and producing. Reggie's love for music began in Cleveland Ohio where, at a young age, he played the trumpet and developed his musical talent. As his love for the performing arts developed Reggie decided to further his knowledge in music. He earned his Bachelor's Degree in Music Education and his Masters in Music Technology

Reggie has his own bands that specialize in jazz, rhythm and blues, and gospel. Reggie plays trumpet, piano and sings. In the studio, Reggie is a performer, audio engineer and/or producer.

Reggie Pittman has performed with many famous names such as; Sarah Vaughan, Lester Bowie, Branford Marsalis, Jaimoe, Natalie Cole, Queen Latifa, Clay Aiken, Curtis Fuller, Eddie Palmieri, Hank Jones, Aretha Franklin, Diahanne Carroll, The Allman Brothers, Louis Bellson, Mitzi Gaynor, Joe Williams, Gladys Knight, The O'Jays, The Brooklyn Philharmonic Orchestra, Ringling Brothers Barnum and Bailey Circus, The Pointer Sisters, Queen, Babyface, the Temptations and more...

Reggie has been the trumpet soloist with The Bergen Philharmonic Orchestra (in 2012), and the Ohio Chamber Orchestra. In 2011, Reggie was a featured soloist with the Duke Ellington Orchestra at Carnegie Hall.

Reggie currently works with the Allman Brother's drummer, Jaimoe. The band is called Jaimoe's Jasssz Band. Their new CD is Renaissance Man.

Jonathon Peretz – (drums) has been playing drums professionally for more than 20 years and is based out of the New York City area. Originally from Ann Arbor/Detroit area, he studied music at Oakland University in Michigan, studying with late Detroit drumming greats Jimmy Allen and Gene Stewarts, as well as Gary Chaffe, and Latin percussion master Johnny Almendra. He has honed his craft working closely with an impressive array of musical masters, including the late trumpet giants Maynard Ferguson, Freddie Hubbard, vocalist Jean Carne, Bob James, Tim Ries, David Mann, guitarist Jimi Tunnell, singer Ben E. King and The Alvin Ailey Dance Theatre to name a few.

Loren Daniels – (keyboard) is a pianist/composer who brings a multiplicity of musical experiences to bear on every project he joins. As a player, he's performed with many notable jazz practitioners including Milt Jackson, Rufus Reid, Makanda (Ken) McIntyre, Warren Smith, Eliot Zigmund and Jon Faddis.

As a bandleader/musical director, Loren has nurtured and developed recording and performance projects for the Pittman/Daniels Quartet, vocalist Macy Chen, bassist August Riska and singer/songwriter Deborah Thurlow. Loren's compositions have been performed by large and small jazz ensembles, choral ensembles, in collaboration with choreographers, for theatrical pieces and educational musicals and for television soundtracks.

As an educator, he taught music for many years in Teaneck, NJ public schools and continues to teach music privately. Loren created Jazz In The Spirit (a jazz worship series) at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Teaneck, NJ and continues as its artist in residence and music coordinator. He studied music at Hofstra University, Berklee College of Music, SUNY at Old Westbury (B.S. in Mu-sic/Education) and NYU (M.A. in Music Education).

Loren is currently performing with the Reggie Pittman/Loren Daniels Quartet, the Bradford Hayes Quartet, One More Once Big Band, the August Riska Trio and vocalists Macy Chen, Cynthia Soriano and Deborah Thurlow. He will soon be releasing a solo CD of Beatle vocal jazz re-imaginings called "Ticket To Ride".

Belden Bullock – (bass guitar and bass viol) Born in Boston, Massachusetts, Bullock learned to play bass guitar before picking up stand-up bass in the early 1970s. He studied at Berklee College of Music from 1977 to 1981 and played in the 1980s with George Adams, Roy Haynes, Andrew Hill, and Ahmad Jamal. He worked in a number of small groups in the 1990s, including Ralph Peterson Jr's Fo'Tet, the Spirit of Life Ensemble and James Weidman's Taja quartet. Other associations in the 1990s included Oliver Lake, Abdullah Ibrahim, Greg Osby, Jay Hoggard, Donald Harrison, Kevin Eubanks, and James Spaulding.

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Program Notes

In The Dark Times was written by Melanie Golding who was inspired by words of Brecht. A member of the Natural Voices Network in the UK, she shared it with Caro Overy, director of Edinburgh's Castle Chorus in which TCC member Barrie Peterson participates.

Together: Keiji Ishiguri vocal arrangement; Julie Flanders words; Emil Adler arrangement. "Here we are together, even if we are all alone" is a feeling we all had during two years of virtual meetings.

Choirs Won't Be Silenced by Chris Mauner was commissioned in 2020 by scores of high school choirs and is "dedicated to all choral singers and their directors during Covid-19". Choir Directors, with singers basically spitting at them, have been sorely tested during the pandemic.
